### In Other Parts of the City, Supporters Sound Off On School Funding, Safety

Common minds recently came together for the common good of Cleveland's students. About 200 parents, community members and other supporters of education attended the Town Hall on Public Education at the Centers for Family and Children Services in Cleveland on January 29. The event was hosted by the Cleveland Teachers Union (CTU) and the non-profit organization <u>Common Good Ohio</u>.

The purpose of this community forum was to guide dialogue be-

tween Cleveland teachers and the community.

"Tonight, we had engaged conversation about where we go from here when it comes to education," said Scherhera Shearer, president of Common Good Ohio. "I'm looking forward to the next step, which is having committees come together to continue their hard work."

Shearer said she was excited about the turnout and some of the themes she heard in breakout sessions.

Most participants, it appears, were there to get information about

Cleveland schools and to express concerns about issues like safety and security, and school funding.

CTU Executive Board member Tracy Radich was part of the steering committee that helped create the event. She anticipates volunteers will be "ready to roll up their sleeves and get to the hard work of implementing a plan of action by May 2013."

To continue the momentum from that night, about 30 community members met in mid-February to plan action steps for the steering committee. "Our parents and community recognize there is a need for better school funding and they want what we want — smaller class sizes and functional schools," said CTU Executive Board member Kurt Richards. The steering committee is also planning discussion and mobilization efforts focused on the governor's budget, said Richards.

Tuesday morning I waited behind a Strongsville school bus that was turning into Zellers Elementary. The bus was packed with young students. When the little ones saw their teachers on the picket line they all stood to their feet, waving and trying to stick their hands out of bus windows. The teachers frantically waved back.

"Be good for the subs today," one teacher yelled.

I thought to myself, "Wow, those students really love their teachers; And those teachers love their students." But that's the story that hasn't been told in the media. Nor has the media made a clear case for why Strongsville teachers are on strike.

Strongsville teachers said they want others to know that they simply want a fair contract. They want to sit at the table with administration. To negotiate in good faith.

So on Wednesday morning, 386 teachers headed to various school sites to strike for the third day in a row. They said they were thankful the weather had spared them, and that they had support from other teachers and neighbors. Some brought them hot coffee and food. Others, hugs and words of encouragement. What will you do?

**Note**: Last Thursday, CTU delegates voted to provide \$1,000 to the Strongsville Education Association, if they indeed walked the line.
